






Veterinary nurse







Veterinary nurses work alongside vets to provide medical care to sick and injured animals.



What you'll do

You'll usually work in a general veterinary practice. You'll need to care about animal welfare without being too sentimental.

Your day-to-day tasks may include:

- speaking to animal owners to find out the problem
- taking blood and urine samples from animals
- taking x-rays
- preparing animals for treatment and assisting vets during treatment
- giving injections, medication, and removing stitches
- talking to pet owners about how to care for their animals
- taking care of in-patient animals
- supervising and helping to train other assistants
- updating records

In smaller practices you may also work on reception.

Working hours and environment

You'll usually work 35 to 40 hours a week, including some evenings and weekends.

You'll be meeting new pet owners regularly and having lots of face-to-face conversations.

You'll spend some time working outdoors if you're treating farm animals or horses. You'll also usually get a uniform and protective clothing.

Career path and progression

With experience, you could take on more responsibility, like practice management, supervising and training new staff, or working in veterinary supplies.

You could also train to specialise in working for a zoological/wildlife park, charity, pharmaceutical company or breeding/boarding kennels.

With further study you could work towards becoming a lecturer or researcher.

Skills required

You'll need:

- the practical skills to handle animals in a calm, confident manner
- a caring nature, so you're tactful and sympathetic with pet owners
- technical skills, to use hardware like x-ray machines
- teamwork skills, as you'll be supporting a wider veterinary team in your work
- ethical judgment, to help you make difficult decisions

Entry requirements

You'll usually need to:

- complete high school or secondary school-level qualifications (in some countries, like the US, this must include a science subject and/or biology)
- study a Level 3, foundation degree, or degree level qualification in veterinary nursing
- complete work experience in an animal setting, like a veterinary practice, kennels, or animal welfare centre
- be registered with an accredited veterinary organisation in your country, like the RCVS (UK) or EAEVE (Europe), which can include taking an exam (in the US)

In the US, some states will require registration whilst others will not. In those that do, like Indiana or Tennessee, you'll also need to complete a postgraduate qualification which can take two to four years.

If you study a lower level qualification than a degree, you may then need to complete on-the-job training. Alternatively, in the UK, you could train through an apprenticeship.


