Also called: Keeper, animal keeper, zoo keeper

Zookeepers work in zoos, safari parks, or aquariums to feed, clean out, and look after animals.



What you'll do

You could work in small or large zoos and safari parks owned privately or by charities. You could work with mammals, reptiles, amphibians, birds, and fish.

You could also work in sea zoos and aquariums.

Your day-to-day tasks may include:

- preparing food and feeding animals
- cleaning out pens and cages and changing bedding
- making sure animals live in as close to natural conditions as possible
- checking for signs of distress or disease and caring for sick animals
- checking enclosures and cages for signs of wear or damage
- monitoring conditions like temperature and humidity
- keeping daily healthcare records on paper and computer
- giving educational talks to children and adults

You'll usually work with one type of animal or in a particular section of the zoo.

Working hours and environment

You'll usually work shifts including weekends and bank holidays. Outside your working hours, you may be on a rota for call-outs in case another staff member is not available or there's an emergency.

Zookeeper : careers library

You'll spend a lot of time outside in all weathers. This work is physically demanding, and could involve working in uncomfortable positions, like crouching down to feed animals or clean out cages.

You'll be around other people a lot of the time, from your colleagues to members of the public visiting the zoo.

Career path and progression

In larger zoos, you could progress from keeper to team leader or head keeper. With experience and a degree, you could become a curator.

You could also move into education or conservation research.

Skills required

You'll need:

- the practical skills to handle animals with confidence
- a caring nature, to treat animals with compassion
- good observation skills, to notice any signs of distress or disease in animals
- good teamwork skills, as you'll often work with other people
- strong communication skills, as you'll likely be writing notes, sharing information with your team, or giving presentations to the public

Entry requirements

To become a zookeeper, you'll usually need:

- a high school diploma (US) or Level 3 qualifications like A levels (UK) or an equivalent qualification in a related subject like animal care or animal science
- experience of working with animals. You could volunteer or apply for a work placement in a zoo, farm, safari park, kennels, or riding stables
- to pass a criminal records background check

As this is a popular role, some zoos ask that you have a higher national diploma, foundation degree, or degree in a relevant subject like animal management, zoology, or veterinary science.

In the UK, you may be able to get into this role by doing an apprenticeship in an area like animal training or animal care and welfare, then becoming a trainee zookeeper.

You may need a driving licence if you're working in a large zoo or safari park.




